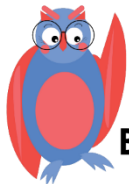

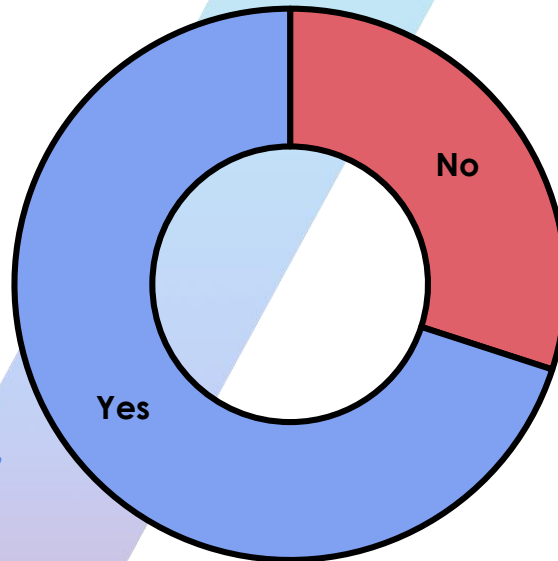

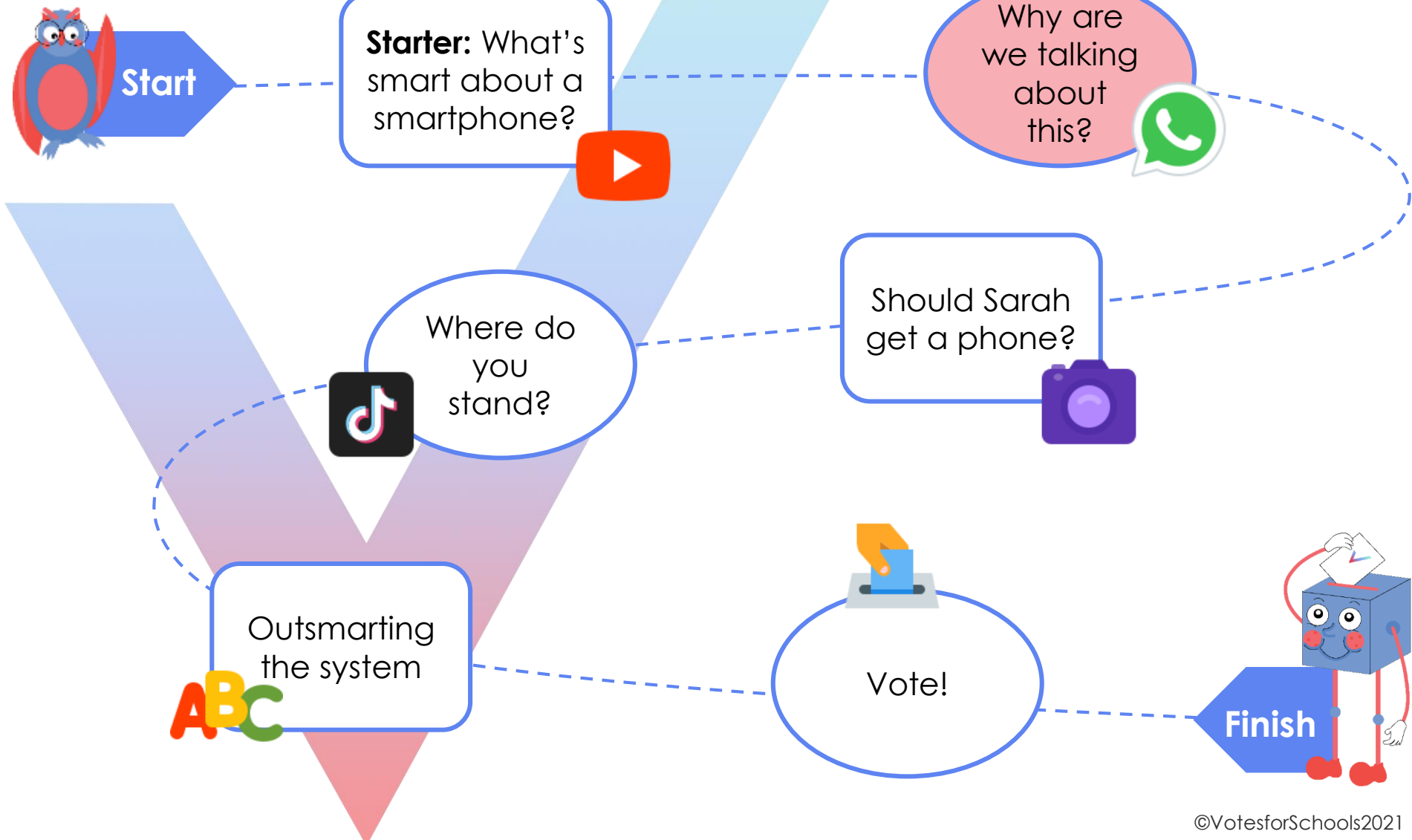

Why are we talking about this?



Technology like phones and tablets are incredibly **useful!** They can make **travelling safer**, help us **keep in touch** with friends, or even **help our learning**.

However, sometimes phones in schools can **distract** children from their learning or even be used for **bullying**.

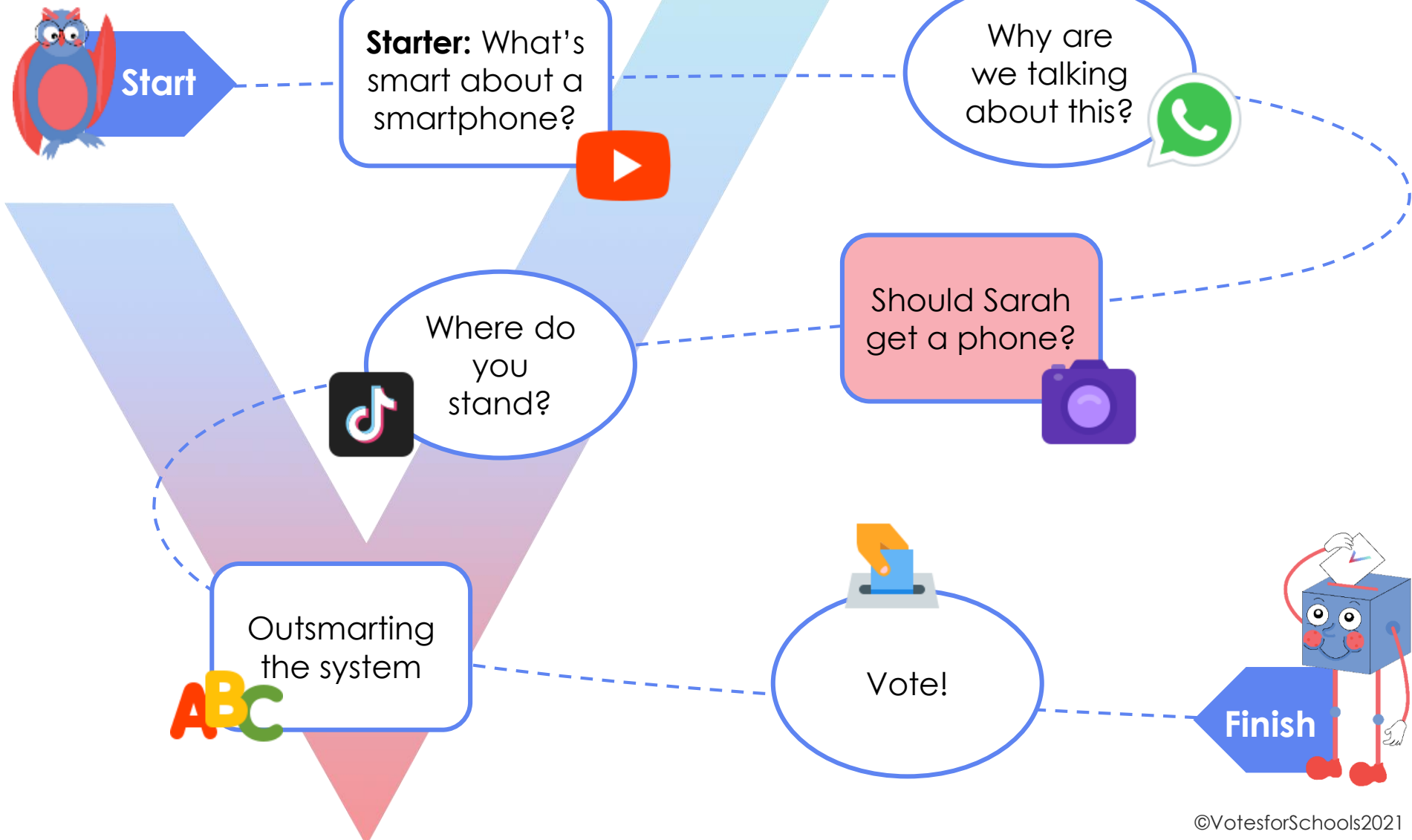

Should Sarah get a phone?

If you bring your phone to school, it's more likely to get lost, stolen or broken.

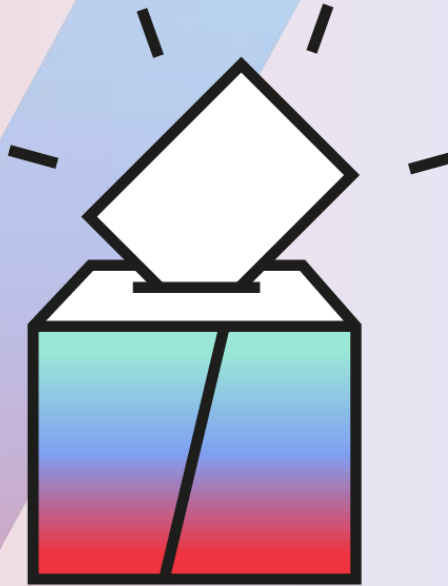
